All December long, Bend's holiday events invite residents to step out and celebrate the season Central Oregon–style. The annual Bend Christmas Parade turns downtown into a corridor of festive floats, marching bands, and holiday music, with Santa's grand entrance delighting kids and grandparents alike.

Just a few blocks away, the community Christmas Tree Lighting brings people together to watch Bend's towering tree come to life with thousands of sparkling lights, live music, and photo opportunities with Santa. Cascadians often make an evening of it, meeting friends, supporting local businesses, and soaking up the small-town charm that has helped make Bend one of the nation's favorite retirement destinations.

Festivals, Markets, and Mountain Fun

For those who love a busy social calendar, Central Oregon's winter festivals offer something for everyone. WinterFest in the Old Mill District features live music, food vendors, ice and snow sculptures, and family activities along the Deschutes River, turning a cold weekend into a lively community celebration.

Brickhouse Bend: A Downtown Landmark of Prime Steaks & Fine Dining

Tucked inside Bend's historic Firehall Building, just across from the Oxford Hotel, Brickhouse has become a cornerstone of downtown's dining scene, known for its USDA Prime steaks, fresh wild seafood, and an award-winning wine list. Since opening in this iconic space, Brickhouse has offered Central Oregon a refined yet welcoming steakhouse experience, blending classic American cuisine with Pacific Northwest flavors.

A Legacy in a Historic Space

Brickhouse calls home the beautifully restored 1921 Davidson Meat Market building, a red-brick landmark that once served as an insurance agency before becoming a restaurant. The name "Brickhouse" pays homage to the building's handsome brick walls and arches, which were preserved during a major renovation. Today, the downtown Bend location shares the same high standards as the original Brickhouse in Redmond, both under the vision of owner Jeff Porad, a longtime Central Oregon restaurateur known for his attention to detail and hospitality.

The restaurant's interior combines elegance and comfort, with well-appointed booths, a well-stocked bar, and a patio perfect for al fresco dining. Whether it's a special occasion, a business dinner, or a night out with friends, Brickhouse provides a sophisticated yet relaxed atmosphere that keeps guests coming back.

Steaks & Signature Cuts

At the heart of Brickhouse's menu are its USDA Prime steaks, the highest grade of beef produced in the U.S., sourced from naturally raised, hormone-free cattle in the Northwest and custom-aged for maximum flavor and tenderness.

Highlights from the steak menu include:

Filet Mignon – A center-barrel cut of USDA Prime, often wrapped in bacon, available in 6 oz, 8 oz, and 10 oz portions.

Rib Eye Steak – A heavily marbled, richly flavored cut, grilled to order and served with a choice of sauce (Béarnaise, peppercorn demi-glace, Bordelaise, or bone-marrow butter).

Blackened Rib Eye – The same premium rib eye, seared with Cajun spices for a bold, spicy crust.

Top Sirloin – A flavorful, leaner option, still cut from USDA Prime beef.

American Wagyu Filet & Cuts – Featuring Winterfrost Wagyu (a Japanese Wagyu crossed with Black Angus), including a Wagyu filet, rib eye, and New York strip, for an ultra-luxurious experience.

Guests can also build their own surf & turf, adding grilled prawns, beer-battered prawns, seared sea scallops, Dungeness crab Oscar, or a New England lobster tail to any steak.



Beyond the Steak: Seafood, Pasta & More

While steaks are the star, Brickhouse's menu shines with fresh wild seafood and scratch-made dishes:

Wild Seafood – Fresh fish of the day, New England lobster (single or double tail), a seafood platter (lobster, scallops, and prawns), and beer-battered prawns.

Pasta & Chops – Seafood pasta with prawns, scallops, and fresh fish; beef tenderloin pasta; chicken Marsala; and Kurobuta pork osso bucco.

Appetizers & Salads – Seafood cocktails (Dungeness crab, ocean prawns), prime meatballs, steak tartare, baked brie, crab & shrimp cakes, and classic salads like Caesar, wedge, and beet salad.

The kitchen emphasizes quality ingredients, using hormone-free and antibiotic-free proteins and many organic products, ensuring a clean, flavorful experience from appetizer to dessert.

Awards & Recognition

Brickhouse has earned consistent acclaim for its wine program, receiving Wine Spectator's Best of Award of Excellence year after year. This prestigious honor recognizes restaurants with a well-curated, vintage-focused wine list that complements the menu and offers excellent pairings, from classic European reds to standout Oregon and California bottles.

The Bend location has held this award since at least 2011, reflecting its long-standing commitment to quality and service. In addition, the restaurant is frequently highlighted in local guides and reviews as one of Bend's top spots for steak and fine dining.

Winter Activities in Bend: December & January Highlights

Bend, Oregon turns into a snow-dusted wonderland in December and January, offering residents and visitors a perfect mix of outdoor adventure and cozy, small-town holiday charm. While Winterfest doesn't arrive until February, there's plenty of winter magic leading up to it.

Holiday Lights and Cheer

Downtown Bend and the Old Mill District glow with festive lights all season long. From early December through mid-January, twinkling displays line Wall Street and Brooks Promenade, guiding visitors through locally owned boutiques, cafés, and wine bars. Drake Park, overlooking the Mirror Pond, transforms into a peaceful winter stroll after sunset—ideal for families or couples seeking a picturesque holiday walk. The Old Mill District typically illuminates its iconic smokestacks and riverside trails nightly from 5 PM to 10 PM.

Ice Skating in the Cascades

Bend and its surrounding parks set up several seasonal ice-skating rinks perfect for all ages. The Pavilion on Simpson Avenue operates daily from late November through March, with public skate sessions, family nights, and hockey rentals available. For a more natural setting, check out Seventh Mountain Resort's outdoor rink, where you can glide under the open sky amid pine trees and holiday music. Schedules and rental prices vary, so it's best to check Bend Parks and Rec for current times.





Parades and Tree Lightings

Community spirit shines brightest during Bend's annual holiday celebrations. The Downtown Bend Christmas Parade, traditionally held on the first Saturday of December (starting at 12 PM), features local floats, marching bands, and Santa's grand arrival. That same evening, the Downtown Tree Lighting Ceremony draws crowds to the Mirror Pond Plaza around 5:30 PM, complete with carolers and hot cocoa. Up the road in the Old Mill District, another tree lighting and menorah ceremony are held in early December, perfect for families of all backgrounds to share in the season's joy.

Winter Markets and Craft Fairs

Holiday shoppers will find plenty of local flair at Bend's winter markets. The Holiday Makers Market at the Deschutes County Fairgrounds (typically the second weekend of December) showcases over 100 local vendors selling handmade gifts, gourmet treats, and winter décor. Closer to downtown, the Bend Holiday Pop-Up Market at Open Space Event Studios spotlights rotating artisans on weekends throughout December, an opportunity to pick up unique gifts while supporting small businesses.

Snow Adventures at Mt. Bachelor and Beyond

For those drawn to the mountains, Mt. Bachelor, just 22 miles from Bend, offers premier skiing, snowboarding, and tubing all season long. December and January are peak months for powder, and the resort opens most lifts daily from 9 AM to 4 PM. Families can also enjoy guided snowshoe tours through the Deschutes National Forest, led by local outfitters like Wanderlust Tours, which often include evening "starlight" walks with hot cider served along the trail. For simpler thrills, head to Wanoga Sno-Park for sledding, snow play, and wide, packed trails perfect for cross-country skiing.

Whether you're carving fresh tracks on the mountain, strolling under the twinkling lights, or sipping cocoa at a local market, Bend's winter season captures both the outdoorsy heart and festive soul of Central Oregon. From early December through late January, every weekend holds something worth bundling up for.

HOLIDAY RECIPE

Creamy Baked Mac and Cheese

A rich, comforting pasta casserole made with tender macaroni in a velvety cheese sauce, topped with a crispy golden bread-crumb crust. It's a perfect December favorite because it's warm, hearty, and pairs well with everything from roast meats to a simple green salad. Serve it for holiday gatherings, potlucks, or a cozy night in.

Ingredients:

Pasta and Sauce Base

- 12 oz elbow macaroni (or similar short pasta)
- 4 tbsp unsalted butter
- 4 tbsp all-purpose flour
- 3 cups whole milk (or 2% in a pinch)
- 1 cup heavy cream (optional but extra rich)
- 1 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp black pepper
- 1/2 tsp garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp onion powder
- 1/4 tsp smoked paprika (optional, for warmth)

Cheese

- 2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- 1 cup shredded Gruyère or Swiss cheese
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese (for extra flavor)

Topping

- 1 cup panko or regular breadcrumbs
- 2 tbsp melted butter
- 2 tbsp grated Parmesan
- Pinch of salt and pepper



THE HIGH DESERT MUSEUM

This museum has relatively young but influential history rooted in one person's vision for telling the story of the High Desert in an immersive way. It has grown from a small natural history institute into one of the most important cultural institutions in Central Oregon.

Founding and Early Vision

The museum was founded by Donald M. Kerr, a Portland-born naturalist and educator with a passion for wildlife and the landscapes of the High Desert. Kerr first created the Western Natural History Institute in the 1970s, and the museum opened to the public in 1982 as a more expansive, permanent expression of that work. From the start, his goal was not just to display objects in cases but to "wildly excite and responsibly teach," using live animals, recreated historic settings, and hands-on exhibits to immerse visitors in the region.

Growth and Expansion

In its early years, the museum sat on forested land south of Bend with mainly outdoor exhibits and a modest building, but strong community support allowed for steady expansion. Over the following decades, major additions increased gallery space and added hallmark exhibits like Spirit of the West, which walks visitors through a century of High Desert history from Native communities to boomtowns. The campus grew to over a hundred acres with miles of paths, animal habitats, and historic structures, transforming it into a full-day destination.

Recognition and Role Today

As the collection and programming expanded, the museum earned accreditation from national museum organizations and later became a Smithsonian Affiliate, gaining access to broader traveling exhibits and resources. It now serves hundreds of thousands of visitors a year, including large numbers of school groups, and is widely seen as a key place to learn about the cultures, ecology, and history of the High Desert. The institution continues to evolve, with a growing emphasis on Indigenous perspectives and contemporary issues affecting the region's people and landscapes.

Winter Hours and Pace

The High Desert Museum stays open through the winter in Bend, just on a shorter daily schedule, and winter is actually one of the most fun times to visit. From November 1 through February 28, the museum shifts to winter hours of 10:00 am to 4:00 pm, compared with 9:00 am to 5:00 pm in the warmer months. Those shortened hours come with a calmer pace, lighter crowds, and easier parking, so it is much simpler to see the major exhibits in one relaxed visit.

Indoor Exhibits in Cold Weather

Inside, the museum layers together wildlife, history, and art, all focused on the cultures and ecosystems of the High Desert. Families can wander through immersive historic town scenes, Native history exhibits, and rotating art shows while staying warm, with most galleries designed to be hands-on and kid-friendly.

Outdoor Attractions in Winter


Even in winter, the outdoor portions stay open, so visitors can walk forested trails, watch river otters, raptors, and other native animals, and see historic homestead buildings in a real high-desert setting. With snow on the ground, the animal habitats and wooded paths feel more like a living nature documentary than a traditional museum, as long as you dress for the weather.


Programs, Cafe and Visit Length

Throughout the winter, the daily schedule still features talks and demonstrations like Bird of Prey encounters and natural history walks, though times can vary by day. The on-site Rimrock Café and Silver Sage Trading gift shop operate during museum hours, and staff recommend planning at least two to three hours to enjoy both the indoor galleries and outdoor animal areas without rushing.



BEND FOUNDER PROFILE





Alexander McClurg Drake, widely known as the founder of Bend, Oregon, was a Midwest investor and Oregon pioneer whose vision transformed a remote outpost called "Farewell Bend" into a platted town that would become one of Central Oregon's most important cities. His combination of capital, engineering ambition, and appreciation for the Deschutes River landscape laid the foundations for Bend's neighborhoods, industry, irrigation system, and early electric power.

Early Life and Background

Alexander M. Drake was born on January 11, 1859, in Xenia, Ohio, the son of Caroline Matilda McClurg and Elias Franklin Drake, a prominent railroad businessman and Minnesota state senator. Growing up in a family tied to railroads and finance, Drake became a Minnesota investor himself, developing the business skills and access to capital that later enabled his large-scale projects in the West.

By the late 19th century, Drake was part of a class of entrepreneurial "capitalists" who looked to the American West for new opportunities, especially where transportation, timber, and water could be leveraged for development. The Panic of 1893 and shifting economic conditions pushed him to look beyond Minnesota, setting the stage for his move toward Central Oregon.

Journey to "Farewell Bend"

In June 1900, Alexander Drake and his wife, Florence (Ada Florence Williams), traveled by covered wagon to what was then known as "Farewell Bend" on the Deschutes River in Central Oregon. Local history notes that Florence was captivated by the view of the Cascades and the river, and her enthusiasm helped fix the Drakes' decision to settle on the site where Bend now stands.

When the Drakes arrived, the settlement was little more than a frontier outpost with only a handful of structures and roughly a couple dozen residents. They built their home, known as Drake Lodge, near the river; the town center of Bend would later grow up around that property, anchoring what eventually became downtown.

Founding and Platting the Town

Drake quickly moved from homesteader to town builder. On October 18, 1900, he formed the Pilot Butte Development Company, a vehicle to acquire land, plan streets, and promote settlement. Working with engineers and surveyors, he platted the original Bend townsite, laying out the street grid that still shapes the core of the city today.

At a time when Bend was just transitioning from "Farewell Bend" to a formal municipality, Drake's company created many of the first residential neighborhoods and business lots. Bend was incorporated as a city in 1905, and contemporary accounts credited Drake's development work and town plat as central to that shift from scattered cabins to an organized community.

Cascade Village Phase 2 Development




