February at Cascade Village is designed to bring people together, with the calendar offering dozens of chances to connect, laugh, and look out for one another. The month begins with the First Friday



Bend WinterFest Update: A Bigger, Brighter Winter Celebration

Following last month's preview of Bend WinterFest, the long-awaited weekend has now come and gone, and it more than lived up to the anticipation. This year's festival once again transformed the Old Mill District into a lively winter playground, with music, art, family activities, and outdoor fun filling every corner of the riverfront. Over three packed days, WinterFest delivered on its promise of being Central Oregon's signature winter celebration, offering something for everyone who came out to enjoy the crisp February air.

Live music remained a major highlight, with performances on the main stage drawing big crowds throughout the weekend. Festivalgoers danced to high-energy sets from acts like Saxsquatch, Brandi Cyrus, and 80s icon Tiffany, whose throwback hits kept the nostalgia and sing-alongs going well into the night. OMSI's hands-on science exhibits gave kids and adults a chance to tinker, experiment, and learn together, while the always-popular K9 Kings dog show impressed crowds with high-flying frisbee catches and clever tricks. These family-focused experiences helped make WinterFest feel welcoming for all ages, from toddlers to grandparents.

Food, drink, and shopping rounded out the festival, turning WinterFest into a full sensory experience. Multiple marketplaces, featuring local artisans, outdoor gear, and Oregon-made products, gave visitors a chance to browse and support small businesses while taking breaks from the outdoor action. Food carts and beverage vendors served everything from hearty comfort food to sweet treats, craft beer, wine, and warm drinks to help everyone stay cozy. Runners and walkers also had a reason to bundle up and join the fun, thanks to the Hot Cocoa Run 5K and the kid-friendly Mini Marshmallow Run. Participants completed festive routes before being rewarded with a hot cocoa bar at the

finish line, making these events as much about community spirit as they were about fitness. Families especially appreciated the Mini Marshmallow Run, where kids collected cocoa ingredients along the course and celebrated with a warm drink at the end.



RESTAURANT HIGHLIGHT

Lady Bird Cultural Society in Bend is a wood-fired, supper-club-style restaurant and cocktail bar that combines vintage glamour with a modern, chef-driven menu in the Old Mill District along the Deschutes River. It has quickly become a destination for special nights out, thanks to its ambitious food, serious beverage program, and lively, music-infused atmosphere.

Founders and Vision

Lady Bird is the first independent venture from executive chef and proprietor John Gurnee and his wife and business partner Amanda, who opened the restaurant after nearly a decade of cooking and leading kitchens in Bend. John trained at San Francisco's California Culinary Academy and cooked at acclaimed spots including Wayfare Tavern before relocating to Central Oregon in 2014 to help shape Bend's growing restaurant scene.

The couple had talked about opening a restaurant together for more than twenty years, always circling back to bird-themed concepts inspired by John's love of bird hunting and the "flock" of his wife and daughters. Lady Bird's name also nods to former First Lady "Lady Bird" Johnson and her focus on beautifying public spaces, echoing the flowers and wildlife along the riverfront where the restaurant now lives.

History and Setting

After years of visiting Central Oregon, the Gurnees committed to making Bend home and becoming part of its culinary community, with John joining the Drake team in 2014 and later opening Washington Dining & Cocktails. In 2022, when a prime Old Mill District retail space overlooking the Deschutes became available, they seized the opportunity, spending months on demolition, design, and building out the theatrical dining room that would become Lady Bird Cultural Society.

Lady Bird held a soft opening in mid-January and then fully opened to the public as one of Bend's most anticipated new restaurants, described as "a space unlike anything else in town" for its dramatic, supper-club ambiance. The room layers vintage flair, plush seating, moody lighting, and a prohibition-era aesthetic, over a modern layout that transitions naturally from happy hour to dinner service and late-night drinks.

Menu and Dining Experience

The kitchen centers on wood-fired cooking, artisan pizzas, handmade pastas, and a raw bar, supported by an ever-changing selection of seasonally driven small and large plates. Guests might build a meal around crowd favorites like the Bird's Nest bread service, citrus salads, bone marrow, crudo, scallops, or wagyu tartare, before moving on to mains such as halibut, Balsamic beef short rib, or richly topped mushroom pizzas and gnocchi.



A Champagne-friendly brunch and tasting-style dinners broaden the experience, while vegetarian guests find thoughtful options woven throughout the menu instead of as an afterthought. Reviewers consistently highlight the balance of sophistication and comfort: plates are elegant and shareable, yet generous enough to turn an evening into a lingering feast that can easily "accidentally" span the whole menu.

Cocktail Bar and Wine Program

Lady Bird's full bar leans into prohibition-era classics with modern twists, serving what it calls "exquisite libations" every day from mid-afternoon through the evening. Signature cocktails range from polished takes on Old Fashioneds and Martinis to bright, approachable drinks like a house Lemon Drop, all crafted to pair with wood-fired dishes and raw bar selections.

The beverage program extends to a deep wine list with an emphasis on food-friendly bottles and bubbles, a natural fit for the restaurant's Champagne brunch and celebratory feel. Happy hour, offered daily from 3-5 p.m., features a full bar with specially priced drinks and bar bites, drawing both locals and visitors for pre-dinner cocktails or an unfussy afternoon at the rail.

Music, Atmosphere and Special Events

Set in Bend's Old Mill District, Lady Bird opens its doors on warm evenings to let live music from the nearby riverfront venue drift into the dining room and onto the patio, adding an effortless soundtrack to dinner and drinks. Guests describe the space as romantic and "swanky," ideal for date nights, pre-concert dinners, birthdays, and other special occasions where the experience matters as much as the food.

Beyond nightly service, Lady Bird hosts holiday bookings and private events, positioning itself as a cultural hub where theatrical hospitality, what Chef Gurnee likens to staging a Broadway show, meets Bend's love of great food, wine, and music. From happy hour at the bar to Champagne-fueled brunches and celebratory dinners that stretch late into the evening, the restaurant invites guests into a world that feels transported yet deeply rooted in its riverside Oregon home.

RECIPE HIGHLIGHT

A Classic Chowder in a Sourdough Breadbowl

Few dishes capture coastal comfort quite like a steaming bowl of New England clam chowder served inside a warm, crusty sourdough bread bowl. The briny sweetness of clams, the richness of cream, and the earthiness of potatoes come together in a silky, satisfying soup that turns simple ingredients into something worthy of a special evening at home. Nestled in toasted sourdough, this classic chowder becomes both meal and vessel, inviting you to break off pieces of the bowl as you go, soaking up every last drop.

Yield and Timing

- Yield: 4 generous servings
- Active time: 35–40 minutes
- Total time: 50–60 minutes

Ingredients:

- 6–8 ounces thick-cut bacon or salt pork, diced
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 medium yellow onion, finely diced
- 2 ribs celery, finely diced 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour (for light thickening)
- 3 cups clam juice (bottled or reserved from steaming fresh clams)
- 1 cup water or light seafood/ chicken stock
- 2–3 medium Yukon Gold or russet potatoes, peeled and ½-inch diced (about 2½–3 cups)
- 1 bay leaf
- ½ teaspoon dried thyme or 1½ teaspoons fresh thyme leaves
- 2 (6.5-oz) cans chopped clams, undrained
- Or about 1½ cups chopped cooked fresh clams
- 1½ cups heavy cream
- ½ cup whole milk or half-and-half (adjust to desired richness)
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 1–2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley or chives, for garnish

For the sourdough bread bowls

- 4 small round sourdough boules (about 6–7 inches across)
- 2–3 tablespoons olive oil or melted butter
- 1 clove garlic, cut in half (optional, for rubbing)
- Pinch of salt

Prepare the sourdough bread bowls

- 1. Preheat and prep**
 - Heat oven to 375°F.
 - With a sharp serrated knife, slice a "lid" off the top of each sourdough boule (about ½–¾ inch thick).
- 2. Hollow the bowls**
 - Gently pull out the interior crumb, leaving about ½–¾ inch of bread wall and bottom so the soup doesn't leak.
 - Reserve the insides for dipping or croutons.
- 3. Season and toast**
 - Lightly brush the inside of each bowl and lid with olive oil or melted butter.
 - Optional: Rub cut garlic clove around the inside for a subtle garlic note, then sprinkle a tiny pinch of salt.
 - Place bowls and lids on a baking sheet and toast 10–12 minutes, until the edges are lightly crisp but not hard.
 - Set aside while you finish the chowder. (This step helps the bowls resist sogginess.)

Make the chowder

- 1. Cook the bacon**
 - In a large, heavy pot or Dutch oven over medium heat, cook the diced bacon until crisp and browned, 8–10 minutes.
 - Use a slotted spoon to transfer bacon to a paper-towel-lined plate. Leave about 2 tablespoons of fat in the pot (pour off excess if needed).
- 2. Sauté aromatics**
 - Add butter to the pot with the bacon fat.
 - Stir in onion and celery, cooking over medium heat until soft and translucent, 6–8 minutes.
 - Add garlic and cook 30–60 seconds more, just until fragrant (don't brown it).
 - Build the base and thicken lightly
 - Sprinkle flour over the vegetables and stir for 1–2 minutes to form a light roux; it should look pasty but not dry.
 - Slowly pour in clam juice and water/stock while stirring, smoothing out any lumps.
- 3. Add potatoes and seasonings**
 - Stir in diced potatoes, bay leaf, and thyme.
 - Bring to a gentle boil, then reduce heat to a simmer.
 - Cook 12–15 minutes, stirring occasionally, until potatoes are tender but not falling apart.
 - For a thicker chowder, lightly mash a small portion of the potatoes against the side of the pot and stir back in.
- 4. Finish with clams and cream**
 - Stir in chopped clams along with their juices, and most of the cooked bacon (reserve some for garnish).
 - Lower the heat to just below a simmer, then add heavy cream and milk/half-and-half.
 - Warm gently 3–5 minutes; avoid boiling once dairy is in, to prevent curdling or toughness in the clams.
 - Taste and season with salt and pepper.

Assemble and serve in bread bowls

1. Place warm toasted sourdough bread bowls on plates.
2. Ladle hot clam chowder into each bowl, filling almost to the top.
3. Garnish with reserved bacon and chopped parsley or chives.
4. Serve immediately with the bread "lid" and torn interior pieces on the side for dipping.

Tips and variations

- Extra thick chowder: Add an additional tablespoon of flour with the roux or mash more potatoes into the broth.
- Smokier flavor: Use smoked bacon or a bit of smoked salt at the end (a pinch goes a long way).
- Using fresh clams: Steam 3–4 pounds of scrubbed littlenecks in 3–4 cups water until they open, chop the meat, and use the clam cooking liquid (strained) instead of bottled juice.
- Make-ahead: Cook chowder up to the point before adding clams and dairy; cool and refrigerate. Reheat gently, then add clams and cream just before serving for best texture.

RESORT COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHT

Black Butte Ranch is a 1,800-acre resort community in Central Oregon that combines mountain scenery, full-service amenities, and four-season recreation, with winter turning the property into a cozy snow retreat that is still only about 40 minutes from Bend.

Location and Close-to-Bend Appeal

Set at the base of Black Butte near Sisters, the Ranch is ringed by ponderosa pines, meadows, and views of up to seven Cascade peaks, including Black Butte and Mount Washington. It spans roughly 1,800 acres, with more than 1,200 homes, miles of paths, and a gated layout that feels like a self-contained village in the forest. The drive from Bend is about 33 miles via Highway 20, usually 40–45 minutes, so locals can leave town after work and still have time for an evening soak, dinner, or a moonlit walk on the ranch's paths.

Lodging, Layout, and On-Site Conveniences

Lodging at Black Butte Ranch centers on privately owned vacation homes, condos, and lodge rooms managed as vacation rentals, giving guests full kitchens, fireplaces, and decks while keeping them close to recreation centers.

Neighborhoods are threaded by 17–23 miles of paved multi-use trails, making it easy to bike or walk to pools, the Lakeside area, or trailheads without getting in the car. On-site infrastructure includes three restaurants, a general store, recreation centers, equipment rental outlets, and the Lakeside complex with fitness facilities and water features.

Year-Round Recreation and Summer Highlights

In the warmer months, the Ranch revolves around two 18-hole championship golf courses (Big Meadow and Glaze Meadow), multiple outdoor pools, tennis and pickleball courts, horseback riding, disc golf, and private fly-fishing on Phalarope Lake. Families use the path system for biking and jogging, while guided clinics introduce guests to stand-up paddleboarding, kayaking, climbing, and yoga or fitness classes. Nearby Sisters and Bend add river floats on the Deschutes, mountain biking, craft breweries, and a broad dining scene, all close enough for day trips before returning to the quieter Ranch in the evening.

Winter Activities and Snow-Season Perks

In winter, Black Butte Ranch becomes a winter playground, with groomed cross-country ski and snowshoe trails laid out on Big Meadow and sometimes Glaze Meadow golf courses whenever there is at least six inches of snow. Guests can rent cross-country skis and snowshoes from the Glaze Meadow Rental Shop, making it easy for Bend residents to drive up for a day or weekend without bringing gear. The ranch's 17–23 miles of paved paths double as winter walking and casual snowshoe routes, and staff actively encourage family snowball fights, fort building, igloo construction, and general play in the snow around meadows and neighborhoods.

Black Butte Ranch is also the official lodging partner for Hoodoo Ski Area, a family-friendly ski hill about 13 miles west, with 1,035 feet of vertical drop, multiple lifts, night skiing, 15.8 kilometers of groomed Nordic trails, and the Autobahn Tubing Park. Santiam Sno-Park and Ray Benson Sno-Park sit just beyond Hoodoo and offer sledding hills and an extensive network of trails for snowmobiles, skiers, snowshoers, dog teams, and skijorers; required Sno-Park permits are sold at Black Butte Ranch, Hoodoo, and in Sisters. This cluster of on-ranch trails, a partner ski area, and nearby Sno-Parks means guests can mix Nordic laps, tubing, downhill runs, and mellow snow play in a single weekend without long drives.

Pools, Spa, and Indoor Comforts

Even in mid-winter, guests have access to indoor pools, outdoor hot tubs, a sauna, and a steam room through the spa and Lakeside fitness complex, giving everyone a warm place to land after hours in the snow. Spa guests can book massages, facials, and body treatments, browse the sports and gift shop's skin care and resort wear, and then linger with full access to the indoor pool, fitness center, and hot tub. Many rentals feature fireplaces or wood stoves, which, combined with on-site restaurants and game spaces, turn the Ranch into a classic Central Oregon lodge experience: head outside for skiing or snowshoeing, then retreat to a warm home base as the snow falls.

Family Programs, Food, and Why Locals Go

Seasonal kids' programs and activity centers provide structured fun, arts and crafts, sports, water play in summer, and winter break programming, while freeing parents and grandparents to enjoy the spa, golf (in season), or quiet walks. Dining spans casual cafés to a lakeside restaurant, where menus lean on regional ingredients and big mountain views, and social media highlights winter pairings like snowshoeing, indoor pools, award-winning dining, and spa visits in a single day. For Bend residents, the combination of short travel time, full-service amenities, genuine winter infrastructure (Nordic grooming, Hoodoo partnership, Sno-Parks), and year-round comforts makes Black Butte Ranch feel like a destination resort that functions as a close, reliable escape for weekends, holidays, or quick mid-week resets.

For his research he creates new iridescent materials that mimic the structures of beetle shells — and can be used for sensing and coloration. He's been a crossword fan since his days as a postdoctoral student at M.I.T. This is his fifth construction for The Times. — W.S.
