May in Bend, Oregon, is nothing short of magical. Honoring Those Who Made the Ultimate Sacrifice

Memorial Day, observed on the last Monday of May, is more than a long weekend or the unofficial start of summer. It's a day set aside to honor the men and women of our armed forces who died in service to our country. In Bend, this 纪念 is taken seriously and carried out with grace, gratitude, and community pride.

This year, the Bend Memorial Day Parade kicks off at 9:00 AM on Monday, May 25, 2026, starting at the Old Mill District and winding through downtown. The parade features local veterans, high school marching bands, first responders, and Scout troops, all marching in tribute to those who gave their lives for our freedom. ceremony is held at the Bend Veterans Memorial Plaza, where reduced flags are flown at half-staff until noon, and local dignitaries, veterans, and families gather to lay wreaths and share personal stories of loss and heroism.

The Deschutes County Veterans Service Office hosts a special "Coffee with a Veteran" event from 10:00 AM to 12:00 PM at the Bend Senior Center, offering a chance for community members to listen to and learn from those who served. For families, the High Desert Museum offers a free "Heroes & History" kids' program, teaching the next generation about the meaning of sacrifice through interactive storytelling and art activities.

Why Memorial Day Matters—Especially Now

In 2026, as the nation reflects on over two decades of continuous military engagement and the evolving nature of global conflict, honoring our fallen feels more urgent than ever. Memorial Day is not just about looking back; it's about committing forward, to support our veterans, to care for their families, and to ensure their sacrifices are never forgotten.

In Bend, that commitment shows up in tangible ways. Local businesses offer discounts to veterans and active-duty military. Meditative Yoga: A Time to Breathe, Restore, and Connect

This gentle approach allows students to listen to their bodies, honor their limits, and find ease in the practice. For many, this is one of the most valuable parts of the class. It is not about achieving a perfect pose or keeping up with anyone else. Instead, it is about creating space for personal well-being and supporting a sense of calm that lasts long after the class is over.

FAVORITE RECIPE

Chicken Tacos

Here's a recipe for Carnitas Tacos (Tacos de Carnitas) —one of Mexico's most popular and beloved dishes. Carnitas is tender, juicy pulled pork that's slow-cooked until fork-tender, then crisped to perfection. It's a crowd-pleaser for taco night!

Slow Cooker Carnitas Tacos

(Easier home version-no deep frying required)

Prep Time: 10 minutes

Prep Time: 8-10 hours (slow cooker)

Serves: 8 tacos

Ingredients for the Carnitas:

- Pork shoulder (boneless, skinless) 4 lbs
- Garlic cloves, chopped 4
- Chili powder 2 tsp
- Dried oregano 1 tsp
- Ground cumin 1 tsp
- Yellow onion, chopped 1
- Orange, juiced 1 (about ½ cup)
- Jalapeño, deseeded & diced 1
- Salt 1 tsp
- Black pepper ½ tsp

Instructions:

1. Season the pork: Mix oregano, cumin, black pepper, salt, and chili powder. Rub generously over the entire pork shoulder.
2. Slow cook: Place pork in slow cooker. Add onion, garlic, jalapeño, and orange juice. Cover and cook on low 8-10 hours (or high 5-6 hours) until meat falls apart easily.
3. Shred the pork: Remove pork to a cutt board. Shred with two forks. Reserve 1 Cup of the cooking liquid.

For Serving:

- 6-8 corn or flour tortillas (warmed)
- ½ cup red onion, finely diced
- ½ cup fresh cilantro, chopped
- Limes, cut into wedges
- Optional: guacamole, cotija cheese, salsa verde, pickled onions
