### Exploring Bend and the Surrounds



### Friday, March 13: Kicking Off the Weekend



## Global Observance

### International Women's Day: Celebrating History, Purpose, and Progress

International Women's Day (IWD), observed annually on March 8, traces its roots to the early 20th-century labor and women's rights movements in Europe and North America. It emerged from the 1908 New York march where 15,000 women demanded better pay, shorter hours, and voting rights, inspiring the 1910 International Socialist Women's Conference in Copenhagen to propose an annual "Women's Day" for equal rights promotion. The first IWD was celebrated in 1911 across Austria, Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland, with over a million attending rallies for women's suffrage and workplace equality.

The choice of March 8 links to the 1917 Petrograd strike by women protesting food shortages and World War I, sparking the Russian Revolution that led to Tsar Nicholas II's abdication and women's voting rights. The UN adopted March 8 as a global observance in 1977, solidifying its role in advancing gender parity and women's empowerment worldwide. Today, IWD celebrates women's social, economic, cultural, and political achievements while advocating for equality, reproductive rights, and safety from discrimination.

International Women's Day honors not just women as a group but also specific trailblazers whose courage, intellect, and activism helped open doors for millions of others. These women span science, politics, civil rights, literature, and humanitarian work, and their legacies are often highlighted in schools, media features, and IWD events around the world.

### Pioneers in science and medicine

**Marie Curie (1867–1934)** – Born in Poland and later working in France, she was the first woman to win a Nobel Prize (Physics, 1903) and the only person to win Nobel Prizes in two different sciences (Physics and Chemistry, 1911). Her research on radioactivity laid the foundation for modern cancer treatments and medical imaging.

**Elizabeth Blackwell** – The first woman to receive a medical degree in the United States, she broke into a male-dominated profession and later founded the New York Infirmary for Women and Children, creating opportunities for women in medicine.

### Champions of civil rights and equality

**Rosa Parks (1913–2005)** – Her refusal to give up her seat to a white passenger on a segregated bus in Montgomery, Alabama, in 1955 sparked the Montgomery Bus Boycott and became a defining moment in the U.S. Civil Rights Movement.



**Harriet Tubman (1822–1913)** – A formerly enslaved woman, she became a key leader of the Underground Railroad, helping hundreds of enslaved people escape to freedom and later advocating for women's suffrage and civil rights.

### Leaders of women's rights and suffrage

**Emmeline Pankhurst (1858–1928)** – The leading figure of the British suffragette movement, she founded the Women's Social and Political Union and led militant campaigns that helped secure the vote for many women in the UK.

**Clara Zetkin** – A German socialist and feminist, she first proposed the idea of an annual International Women's Day in 1910, which became the basis for the March 8 observance worldwide.

### Voices in literature and public life

**Maya Angelou (1928–2014)** – An American poet, memoirist, and civil rights activist, she wrote groundbreaking works such as *I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings* and used her voice to speak out against racism and sexism while inspiring generations. **Jane Austen (1775–1817)** – Though she lived long before IWD, her novels are often celebrated on the day for their sharp critique of women's limited social and economic options in 18th–19th century England.

### Modern icons and humanitarian figures

**Malala Yousafzai** – A Pakistani activist for girls' education who survived an assassination attempt by the Taliban and later became the youngest Nobel Peace Prize laureate in 2014, using her platform to advocate for millions of girls worldwide.

**Audrey Hepburn (1929–1993)** – From her iconic film career she transitioned into a UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador, dedicating her later years to helping children in war-torn regions and poor communities.

# RECIPE HIGHLIGHT

## A Fresh March Feast: Lemon-Herb Salmon with Roasted Asparagus & Potatoes

As March straddles winter and spring, this light yet satisfying dish celebrates early-season asparagus, crisp potatoes, and bright citrus. Lemon-Herb Salmon with Roasted Asparagus & Potatoes combines rich salmon with zesty lemon and earthy roasted vegetables for a quick weeknight meal that still feels elegant enough for guests.

The recipe highlights in-season produce while delivering a balanced plate of salmon-packed protein and fiber-rich vegetables. Herbs and lemon lend a fresh spring-like lift, and roasting caramelizes the edges for comforting warmth, all cooked together on a single sheet pan.

### Yield and Timing

- Servings: 2-4
- Prep time: 15 min
- Cook time: 25-30 min

### Ingredients:

- 1 lb salmon fillet (skin on or off)
- 1 lb small potatoes, halved
- 1 bunch asparagus, trimmed
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- Zest and juice of 1 lemon
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 tsp dried oregano or thyme (or 1 tbsp fresh)
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

### Method

1. Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C). Line a sheet pan with parchment.
2. Toss potatoes with 2 tbsp olive oil, salt, pepper, and half the garlic; roast 15 minutes.
3. Push potatoes to one side, add asparagus and toss with remaining oil, salt, pepper, and a pinch of herbs. Return to oven 10 minutes.
4. Meanwhile, rub salmon with lemon zest, juice, remaining garlic, herbs, salt, and pepper. Place on the same pan.
5. Roast 10-12 minutes until salmon flakes easily and veggies are tender.
6. Optional: scatter a few capers over the salmon before serving for extra brightness.

## Tetherow Resort in Bend, Oregon

Nestled on the eastern edge of Bend, Tetherow Resort is a 700-acre luxury golf and lifestyle community that blends rugged high-desert scenery with polished resort amenities. 
